Your support gave Tinkles a second chance.

Tinkles wandered into a small cat colony in Pelham Manor. This calico cat had a collar and tags, but she would not let anyone approach her to read them. The oldest cat in the colony befriended her, and the group accepted Tinkles, keeping her fed and sheltered.

A caretaker noticed that Tinkles became depressed and listless. In desperation, she used a telephoto lens to take a picture of the tags, knowing that Tinkles' family had to be out there somewhere.

The photograph revealed a phone number, but the number was out of service.

This is where Humane Society of Westchester stepped in. We used the phone number to locate a family member who explained that Tinkles had snuck out of her home two years ago, and that she was both loved and sorely missed.


For three full days, an Humane Society of Westchester Trap-Neuter-Return volunteer tried to catch Tinkles so she could be returned to her family, but Tinkles dodged each attempt.

On the third day, as hope faded, the owner's daughter arrived in Pelham Manor by train. The young woman started to call Tinkles from across the yard. Tinkles' ears perked up; she stopped in her tracks and turned her head toward the young woman. Still unsure, Tinkles hid behind a rock, meowing every time she heard her name. The young woman approached slowly, and Tinkles gradually emerged from her hiding place. The young woman left with Tinkles in her cat carrier, and they returned home where Tinkles was reunited with her loving family who had missed her so much.

Tinkles is an excellent example of the numerous benefits of our Trap-Neuter-Return program, which keeps colonies of stray and feral cats healthy and manageable. This program nurtures cat colonies, monitoring and helping stray cats like Tinkles, and allowing feral cats to live comfortably without burdening our communities by creating more homeless cats and kittens.

Without your support, Tinkles would still be wandering the streets today.

SURPRISED?

Most animals who enter our shelter are pets that became lost. Others are surrendered by their families for reasons including an unwanted litter, a move to no-pet housing, allergies, or financial concerns.

Our goal is for every animal to find their "forever" home, which means matching the right pet with the right family. Upon arriving at our shelter, each animal's health and behavior is evaluated prior to being made available for adoption, which ensures we can find the best home for each animal's individual needs.

While dogs and cats abound, we also welcome rabbits, guinea pigs, hamsters, gerbils, ferrets, and parrots.









Our Commitment to Forever Homes

In an average year, the Humane Society of Westchester shelters 600 cats and 400 dogs, and a variety of other small domestic animals like rabbits and birds.

Last year, we committed to increasing and improving adoptions. Why? Because families like yours in our 19 Westchester communities told us that you want to provide forever homes to pets in need. You want pets to spend less time in the shelter and more time with their forever families.

We heard you! Just a few years ago, pets sometimes stayed in the shelter for a month or longer—but now pets only spend a few weeks with us.

How Your Gift Helps Each Pet

\$500,000 - New and Expanded Vet Surgery Center, redesigned to expand medical care and treatment.

· A high-quality veterinary space will separate surgical work from simple vaccines and microchips for animals being adopted. Currently, the small surgical space is stacked with cages holding cats both before and after surgery, which prevents a good flow of animals through the surgical process.

· New in-house X-ray capability will allow us to more quickly diagnose animal illness and injury and save many thousands of dollars annually, which we currently spend on outside x-ray facilities.

\$250,000 - The Outdoor Entryway is inviting for pets and people alike. The ceiling will be a simple vault to bring in natural light, leading to a larger lobby that is bright and welcoming.

\$250,000 - Cat Room a glass room built right into the new lobby, where adoptable cats roam freely and can meet their new adopter.

\$175,000 - A Dog Run, showcasing adoptable dogs and allowing them to exercise and play.

\$65,000 each - Three New Humane **Education** Community Rooms.

\$75,000 each - Four "Get Acquainted" Rooms, where adopters can meet their new pet.

The Dire Consequences When Our Shelter Doesn't Keep Up

When we don't do adoptions, the number of purchases from puppy mills increases. When we don't do Low Cost Spay Neuter, more unwanted litters occur. When we don't do rescue, more animals suffer without help. The dire consequences of our shelter not keeping up are clear and dramatic.

Pet stores sell puppies all over Westchester—New Rochelle, White Plains, Mamaroneck and Yonkers. Thankfully, New York State allows municipalities to make laws regulating stores that sell puppies to curb the problem of puppy mills.

A puppy mill is a large-scale commercial dog breeding operation where profit is given priority over the well-being of the animals. Not only does this often result in genetic health problems with the puppies, but it also means that the breeding parents are confined in poor conditions that offend humane sensibilities and are often not given veterinary care. Most rescue organizations in the country speak out against unregulated puppy mills for these reasons.

Without the services the Humane Society of Westchester provides, puppy mills flourish!

Here are the cold hard facts:

- 90% of puppies sold in pet stores come from puppy mills
- Puppy mills use and abuse their animals. For example, female dogs are
 usually bred 2x a year. At that rate, they are usually unable to reproduce
 by age 5, at which time they are put to death.
- Almost every puppy sold in a pet store has a mother who spent her entire life in a tiny cage.

The success of our capital campaign is a key factor in curbing these puppy mills. Won't you choose to support us now and help us create a true wellness center for Westchester's animals?

For Your Own Healing Too, Not Just for Your Pets

Research has repeatedly shown that interacting with animals and petting a dog or cat can reduce stress, lower your blood pressure, and generally improve the quality of your life.

"{There is} considerable evidence that pets benefit the lives of their owners, both psychologically and physically, by serving as an important source of social support. Given our increasing understanding of the consequences of loneliness

and social connection and how social support plays a critical role in stress, illness, and even mortality, identifying when and how pets serve owners' social needs is important....There are many positive consequences for everyday people who own pets."
